2. From the Director

Our community at IIM Raipur has always been guided by the ethos of "स्व-कर्म निरतः सिद्धिम" (Sva-Karma Niratah Siddhim), where each member strives for perfection through their actions. This dedication is reflected in our achievements across various domains, from research and academic initiatives to industry partnerships and international collaborations.

We are proud to have secured a distinguished 11th rank in the NIRF rankings announced in 2023. This is a testament to the



hard work and dedication of our faculty, students, and staff, who continue to uphold the highest standards of academic excellence. This year's research output includes 83 scholarly papers, a significant contribution that enriches our educational landscape and enhances classroom teaching with the latest information and methodologies.

Diversity, equity, and inclusion are at the core of our values at IIM Raipur. We are proud to have 62% female students in our 2-year residential MBA program and 25% in our hybrid-mode Executive MBA program, reflecting our commitment to fostering an inclusive and diverse learning environment. We also ensure diversity across social and professional identity groups in all our committees, promoting democratic decision-making within the Institute.

IIM Raipur has also taken significant strides to align with the objectives outlined in our Memorandum of Association (MoA). We have signed new MOUs and continued to build on existing partnerships with institutions such as AIIMS Raipur, HNLU Raipur, and the National Anti-Doping Agency. 

The two-year Post-Graduate Programme Learning Goals are:

To help them become aware of various learning styles and help them establish linkages between their life's goals and management education.

<u>Remarks of the Performance</u> <u>Evaluation Committee:</u>

The Postgraduate Programme in Management is a rigorous, advanced course that is intended to give prospective business leaders the abilities, know-how, and perspectives they need to succeed in the fast-paced, cutthroat corporate environment of today.

- Functional Knowledge Students will use acquired knowledge to understand, analyse, and evaluate complex business problems.
- Decision-making skills- Students will use critical and analytical skills to make decisions backed by data and logic to handle business problems and challenges.
- Oral and Written Communication Skills Students will demonstrate clear written and oral communication skills with entities both internal and external to their organization.
- Ethical Leadership and Team Spirit Students will demonstrate team spirit and leadership at their workplace and behave ethically and responsibly.
- Creativity and Innovation- Management graduate students will use creativity and innovation in solving problems and identifying opportunities in the business world.
- In summary, the objective of the PGP Programme is to develop social responsibility and the zeal for global competitiveness among the management graduates who can effectively contribute to the inclusive growth of the society and, hence, the country.

Preparatory

The preparatory programme is meant for the new batch students who are found relatively under prepared in quantitative and communication skills. Preparatory courses in Accounting, Statistics, working with Excel and Communication are offered immediately after the registration for the PGP Programme for all registered students. These are non-credit optional courses.

Induction

The Induction Module/Orientation Programme is being conducted at the beginning of the first term. All PGP-I students have attended the programme. The objectives of this Programme are as follows:

- To acquaint the students with modern management education, its scope, its functional areas, and the design of the Post Graduate Programme at IIM Raipur.
- To acquaint them with the teaching and learning methods used at IIM Raipur with special emphasis on case methods.



- To help them become aware of various learning styles and help them establish linkages between their life's goals and management education.
- To initiate functional interaction between final-year and first-year students and between first-year students and faculty.
- Two Panel discussions with experts of diverse background from the industry. The topics for Panel discussions were Navigating the Path to long-term success in Management and Rethinking Leadership in the changing business landscape- New Skills and competencies required.







4.2 EMBA

Introduction

The Executive Post Graduate Program in Management (EPGP) is designed to minimize disruption to work and personal pursuits. The Program is spread over twenty-four months. Presently, the fourth batch commenced in December 2023 (EPGP batch 4), and the second batch graduated in April 2024 (EPGP batch 2). The main objective of the Program is to prepare participants for an advanced career in management by giving them a solid foundation in various management topics that are essential for building capabilities to take on the new forms of competition. The Program offers a blend of various general management theories, soft skills, and analytical methods with real-world business scenario cases. It has 1020 hours of content delivery (including 900 hours of teaching) such that it is spread across six terms of (3.5-4) months each. There is also a mini-term that includes a Mini Dissertation and an Integrated simulation project. The selection process is designed to ensure significant diversity in academic, business, and cultural backgrounds. During the program, interaction with peers and faculty will augment skills, understanding of differing perspectives, effective communication, conflict management, negotiation, and mobilizing individuals towards common goals, essential ingredients of effective management practices. The program's goal is to broaden core leadership competencies to enhance participants' professional growth further.

The specific objectives of the program are:

- To develop an ability to integrate decisions and solutions across disciplines in complex decision-making environments.
- To appreciate the influence of macro and micro business environmental factors.
- To incorporate a clear framework for ethical and value-based decision-making supported by unyielding personal integrity.
- To have a professional presence and the ability to articulate a vision is needed to motivate others and lead diverse teams of people.
- To develop values and proactive attitudes for societal well-being.

In summary, the objective of the EPGP Programme is to develop social responsibility and the zeal for global competitiveness among the management graduates who can effectively contribute to the inclusive growth of society and hence the country.

Program Structure

The 24-month EPGP would have six terms plus a mini-term. The program covers two modules of 5 days each of campus immersion. Attending both campus immersions is mandatory from a program requirement. The remaining classes would be held in a live online mode.

- I. **Core Courses:** Core Courses will focus on creating a strong understanding of the fundamental principles of effective management in modern business organizations. This section will also focus on developing an understanding of business in an increasingly globalized economic and political environment. This understanding will help to crystallize fundamental conceptual and analytical knowledge. The courses will be aimed to
 - Create a foundation for understanding business
 - Building blocks of business activities
 - Preparing the candidate for a leadership position



- II. Advanced Core Courses: Advanced-level courses will prepare the student for taking up higher responsibilities and leadership positions.
- III. **Electives:** Electives courses from all major functional areas are designed to meet students' specific career goals depending upon their career/academic interests.
- IV. MiniTerm: This includes
 - Mini Dissertation- to be carried out under the supervision of a faculty member
 - Integrated Business Simulation- this project focuses on applying managerial concepts in real-life settings

4.2.1 Admission

A total of 233 students were admitted for the EPGP 2023-25 batch in December 2023. The batch has participants from leading and diverse organizations such as Accenture, Amazon, Infosys, L&T, Reliance Industries Ltd., TCS, Capgemini, NTPC, Boeing India Private Ltd., and Deloitte, among others. The program received an overwhelming response in terms of hundreds of applications from India and abroad. The EPGP program also has participation from international candidates.



4.3 eMBA HRM

Introduction

The Executive Post Graduate Program in Human Resource Management (EPGP HRM) is designed to minimize disruption to work and personal pursuits. The Program is spread over twenty-four months. Presently, the first batch has commenced from June 2023 (EPGP HRM batch 1). The main objective of the Program is to impart comprehensive and contemporary education on people strategies and HRM competencies to junior, middle, and senior-level HR practitioners, aspiring HR professionals, and entrepreneurs seeking to develop and demonstrate capabilities that are relevant to the present-day demand of the business. The Program offers a blend of various general management theories, soft skills, and analytical methods. Apart from the core HR management skills. It has 1080 hours of content delivery (945 hours by IIM Raipur + 135 hours through Masterclass/Workshop y SHRM) such that it is spread across six terms of (3.5-4) months each. There is also a dedicated Masterclass session organized by SHRM India, with corporate CHROs and seasoned HR practitioners, which are blended within the two years of the program. The selection process is designed to ensure significant diversity in academic, business, and cultural backgrounds. During the program, interaction with peers and faculty will augment skills, understanding of differing perspectives, effective communication, conflict management, negotiation, and mobilizing individuals towards common goals, essential ingredients of effective management practices. The program's goal is to broaden core leadership competencies to enhance participants' professional growth further.

The specific objectives of the program are:

- To provide an opportunity for the participants to earn a professional qualification in HR.
- To develop an ability to integrate decisions and solutions across disciplines in complex decision-making environments.
- To provide the participants with an in-depth understanding of various concepts in HR.
- To get tuned in to the latest developments and best practices in HR.
- To prepare the participants to head the HR function in the operating divisions.
- Having a professional presence and the ability to articulate a vision is needed to motivate others and lead diverse teams of people.
- To develop a repository of HR experts who can lead the organization with growth, survival, and a digital mindset.
- To incorporate a clear framework for ethical and value-based decision-making supported by unyielding personal integrity.
- To develop values and proactive attitudes for societal well-being.
- To provide Holistic development for aspiring HR Professionals.

Program Structure

The 24 months EPGP HRM would have six terms plus Masterclass/Workshop blended within the 24 months. The program covers two modules, each of which is 5 days of campus immersion. Attending both campus immersions is mandatory from a program requirement. The remaining classes would be held in a live online mode. One credit course consists of 20 sessions of 90 minutes each, equivalent to 30 hours of classroom or online teaching.

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4.4 PhD (Doctoral Programme in Management)

Introduction

IIM Raipur started the Doctoral Programme in Management (earlier Fellow Programme in Management) from AY 2012-13. It is a full-time programme that offers research scholars opportunities for advanced studies and research in different areas of 'Management'. The Programme aims to prepare research scholars for careers in teaching and research in management studies and in related disciplines, and for careers in academic institutions and in other organizations that require advanced analytical and research capabilities.

<u>Remarks of the Performance</u> <u>Evaluation Committee:</u>

More than half of IIM Raipur PhDs are working as faculty in leading IIMs (Bangalore, Indore, Kozhikode, Ranchi, Bodhgaya) and other premier business schools.

The Programme offers its research scholars a unique opportunity to engage in high-quality intradisciplinary as well as interdisciplinary research. The Programme is committed to educating scholars who will become leaders in their fields of research.

Program Objective

- To provide research scholars with the necessary skills to identify and research complex issues in the field of management.
- To contribute to the creation, transmission, and application of knowledge in the field of management.
- To do research and publications of international standards in inter-disciplinary areas of management that will add value to society and the body of knowledge.
- To meet the teaching and research manpower needs of academia and industry by producing highly skilled individuals with exceptional analytical ability and training in conducting specialized research.

Stipend

Research scholars are provided with a fellowship stipend of ₹35,000 per month during the first and second years. The stipend will continue until the research scholar successfully clears the Comprehensive Examination at the end of the second year. Then, for the rest of the program period (i.e., the remaining two), a stipend of ₹40,000 per month is provided.



Additional Grants

A complete package of grants is provided to all PhD scholars. The package has the following components:

- A one-time Computer Grant to purchase a PC/Laptop of ₹50,000/-.
- Cumulative Conference Grant up to ₹2,00,000/- during the Doctoral program for attending International, National Conferences, or Doctoral Consortium Seminar. The maximum amount a student can be reimbursed for one International/National Conference/Doctoral Consortium seminar is Rs 1,50,000/-. In place of the International Conference, one may wish to visit a foreign university to do some research work approved by the TAC to complete his/her thesis work.

The following contingency grant will be available for each doctoral scholar per year, which can be used during the academic year (i.e., from July to June).

First Year – Nil

Second Year – ₹10,000

Third & Fourth Year – ₹ 20,000/- each year


6. International Relations

The activities and initiatives undertaken by the Entrepreneurship Committee at the Indian Institute of Management Raipur are:

1. Activities

- The guest lecture "Udyamee dialogue 2.0" by Ms. Deepthi Ravula, CEO of We-Hub was organized in January'24 focusing on the theme "Building Competence for a Successful Entrepreneurial Journey". This develops into the essential skills and knowledge necessary to navigate the complexities of entrepreneurship effectively.



- Pitch Perfect, an online event was held in February'24 & amp; March'24 which focused on challenging participants to articulate and pitch their business ideas with precision, strategic thinking, and a focus on solving contemporary problems by crafting and presenting innovative business plans.
- An MDP titled Business Curiosity 360° having 15 participants was conducted via the Business Mechanics Lab by Prof. S Ram Kumar in February 2024. The program was based on the consumer consumption value chain.

2. MOU

A Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) with SIDBI (Small Industries Development Bank of India) has been signed on 14th November'23 to promote entrepreneurial activities. This collaboration aims to develop a specialized program under STEM (Skill to Enterprise Module) cultivating innovation and startup ecosystem, aiming to inspire youth to embrace an entrepreneurial mindset.



3. Proposals Initiated

3.1 The Proposal for SWAVALAMBAN: Skill to Enterprise Model (STEM) Program, a joint initiative of IIM Raipur and SIDBI, India, has been shared with SIDBI in March'24, and acceptance has been received. This will be executed as a long-duration academic program spanning 18 months which includes classroom training and handholding support.

13. Student Activities & Achievements

They have immense experience in Economics and public policy domain. Students gained valuable insights and got personalized guidance from these esteemed experts.

The discussion was not a traditional lecture but rather an interactive forum where students actively participated by asking questions, sharing personal experiences, and debating different viewpoints. Endowment Policy: This academic year, 2023-24 Alumni and Advancement Committee have come up with the Endowment Policy for IIM Raipur.





Schedule 23: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of Preparation

The financial statements are prepared in accordance with the Indian Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP) under the historical cost convention, and on the accrual method of accounting. The accounting policies, in all material respects, have been consistently applied and are consistent with those in the previous year.

b) Format for Financial Statement

The financial statements are prepared based on the "Revised format of accounts under Uniform Accounting Standards" (UAS) introduced by the Ministry of Education (formerly known as MHRD) which applicable to all Central Educational Institutions (CEIs) and communicated vide letter number 29/04-2012-IFD dated 17.04.2015 of the Joint Secretary and Financial Advisor, MHRD, Gol, Department of Higher Education, New Delhi. The Institute has followed the framework of accounting procedure prescribed and complied with the guidelines given therein for the preparation of Financial Statements in the new format of accounts from Financial Year 2015-16. The same has been approved by the Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) of India vide their letter number RC(AB)/Misc./Format of A/cs/04-31/2013 dated 10.04.2015.

c) Use of Estimates

The preparation of Financial Statements requires the management to make estimates and assumptions in the reported amounts of assets and liabilities (including contingent liabilities) as of the date of the financial statements and the reported income and expenses during the reporting period. Management believes that the estimates used in preparation of the financial statements are prudent and reasonable. Future results could differ from these estimates. Difference between the actual results and estimates are recognized in the period in which the results are known or materialize.

d) Fixed Assets and Depreciation Tangible Assets

Tangible Fixed Assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and Impairment losses, if any. Cost comprises the purchase price, borrowing costs, if capitalization criteria are met and any cost attributable to bringing the assets to its working condition for its intended use which includes taxes, freight, and installation and allocated incidental expenditure during construction/acquisition.

Capital work in progress is stated at cost less accumulated impairment losses, if any. Cost includes the cost of fixed assets under construction or that are not ready for their intended use. Capital advances are disclosed separately under Loans, Advance and Deposit.

The apportionment of cost from Capital Work in Progress for valuation of Permanent Campus, completed and handed over by the Construction Agency to the Institute was based on constructed area of individual assets in square meters. Thereafter, the Institute had classified these Fixed Assets under their respective blocks.

Expenditures incurred on major renovation in temporary premises is treated as revenue expenditure and charged to Income & Expenditure account.

Fixed Assets classified as BER (Beyond Economic Repair) items are carried at written down value of capital assets, declared as BER items by the Physical Assets Verification Committee at Rs. 1/- per unit.

As per the provision under the File Number 8/6/2017-TS-V (C) from the Ministry of Education Gove





of India, dated 4th October 2017 assets up to the value of Rs. 5,000/- per unit are considered as Small Value Assets.

Library books received as gifts are valued at Rs. 1/- per book.

Fixed Assets are valued at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation on Fixed Assets have been provided under Straight Line Method (SLM) and the rates prescribed under the Revised Format of Accounts of Central Educational Institution (CEIs) approved by CAG. The rates are appended below:

Depreciation is provided for the whole year on addition during the year.

Intangible Assets

An intangible asset is recognized, where it is probable that the future economic benefits attributable to the asset will flow to the enterprise and where its value/cost can be reliably measured. Intangible assets are stated at their cost of acquisition, less accumulated amortization and impairment losses.

Computer Software bought for perpetual uses are classified as Intangible assets and amortized over the period of 2.5 years.

E-Journal Subscriptions are classified as Intangible assets and amortized over the period of 2.5 years.

e) Investments

Investments classified as "Long term investments" are carried at cost. Cost includes acquisition expense like brokerage, transfer stamps. Provision for Decline, other than temporary, is made in carrying cost of such investments.

f) Stocks

Expenditure on purchase of Stationary, Civil items, Plumbing items, Electrical items, and other stores is accounted as revenue expenditure, except that the value of closing stocks held on 31ST March is set up as inventories by reducing the corresponding Revenue Expenditure on the basis of information obtained from Departments. They are valued at cost.

g) Revenue Recognition

Fees from Students including academic, admission, enrolment, hostel, mess fees are recognized on accrual basis.

Interest on Fixed Deposit is recognized on accrual basis.

Interest on Investment out of Corpus Fund has been recognized on accrual basis and credited to Income and Expenditure Account.





h) Foreign Currency Transactions

Transactions denominated in foreign currency are accounted at the exchange rate prevailing at the date of the transaction. Foreign currency monetary items are reported using the closing rate. Non-monetary items which are carried in terms of historical cost denominated in a foreign currency are reported using the exchange rate at the date of the transaction.

Exchange differences arising on the settlement of monetary items or on reporting the Entity's monetary items at rates different from those at which they were initially recorded during the year, or reported in previous financial statements, are recognised as income or as expenses in the year in which they occur.

I) Government Grants

Where a sanction for the release of a grant pertaining to a financial year is received before 31st March and the grant is received in the subsequent financial year, the grant is accounted for on an accrual basis once there is reasonable certainty of its receipt, with an equivalent amount shown as recoverable from the Grantor.

Plan Grants utilized towards the capital expenditure (on accrual basis) is transferred to Capital Fund.

Capital Grants / Funds related to Fixed Assets are transferred to General Fund on a systematic and rational basis over the useful life of the assets, i.e., Capital grants / Funds are transferred to General Fund over the periods and in the proportion in which depreciation is charged.

Grants for meeting Revenue Expenditure (on accrual Basis) are treated, to the extent utilized, as income of the year in which they are realized.

Unutilized Grants (including advance paid out of such grants) are carried forward and exhibited as a liability in the Balance Sheet.

j) Retirement Benefits

Retirement benefits such as gratuity and leave encashment being defined benefit plan are provided based on actuarial valuation.

Capitalized Value of pension and gratuity received from previous employers of the Institution's employees, who have been absorbed in the Institution, is credited to the respective Provision Accounts.

The Actual payments of Gratuity and Leave encashment are debited in the Accounts to the respective provisions. In case of funded plans, the fair value of plan assets is reduced from the gross obligation under the defined benefits plans, to recognise the obligation on the net basis.

Other retirement benefits viz. Contribution to New Pension Scheme is accounted on accrual basis.

k) Provisions, Contingent Liabilities and Contingent Assets

Provisions involving a substantial degree of estimation in measurement are recognized when there is a present obligation as a result of past events, and it is probable that there will be an outflow of resources. Provisions are not discounted to its present value and are determined based on present estimate required to settle the obligation at the Balance Sheet date. These are reviewed at each balance sheet date and adjusted to reflect the current best estimates.

Contingent liabilities are not recognized but are disclosed in the accounts by way of a note. Contingent assets are neither recognized nor disclosed in the financial statements.
